#### **Digital Inclusion Plan**

The County Manager has given a tentative thumbs-up to our Digital Inclusion Plan, which is now going for reviews with the <u>TriangleJ Council of Governments</u>, <u>NC-DIT</u>, and the <u>Institute for Emerging Issues</u>. The IEI folks talked with me last week and they said that they had already browsed our plan and they thought it was very comprehensive and well organized. Our timing seemed to be excellent as the State is gathering information, county-by-county for their own plan that goes back to the Federal Government later this summer.

I'm hoping to share the whole, complete plan with everyone in a month or so.

#### **Digital Inclusion Help**

If you remember, last month I said that the county had awarded Randolph Communications (fiber internet provider) work in Goldston to hook up a communications tower. About two weeks ago, Randolph announced that they would sell internet to residents of Goldston starting this summer! I spoke with Jonathan Hensley, mayor of Goldston at the Chatham Development meeting and congratulated him. That is awesome and I hope we can make similar progress elsewhere in the Chatham.

We are still working with <u>Conterra Networks</u> and <u>Insight</u> for other sites around the county. We didn't make much progress over the past month, but we did see some preliminary cost estimates that look favorable for areas where utilities are run on poles. Apparently, that allows fiber installation at a fraction of the cost of trenching. So, that is good news for some of the less wealthy areas.

<u>Duke Tech Solutions</u> has made a formal offer to the county to assist them in mapping and forecasting costs, which could help the county prioritize grant applications and other projects.

Carl Angel and I had a meeting with Duke Tech Solutions, who is also trying to find a way to help Chatham and other governments with telehealth programs. Rita Van Duinen at the Library mentioned <u>Cyber Seniors</u>, which "provides FREE technology support and training for senior citizens". There website is full of ideas and offers of help, plus a set of webinar recordings. The first one I clicked on sent me down a rabbit hole looking at "<u>Alexa Together</u>". If you remember the UNC and Duke Tech Solution Tech Talk presentation in December, this Amazon offering is trying to help solve the aging-in-place challenge. **If you have any experience with Amazon Together, please let me know.** I'm doing a bit of research on it.

Rita Van Duinen and I met with some folks from UNC's IT department who are looking for volunteer opportunities. We came up with an idea to run a 'help desk' day at the library later this summer. I think we could add onto what help they will give with flyers and discussions about the Kramden Institute programs and maybe the ACP. Keep this in mind and I'll ask for volunteers when we pick a date.

## **STEM Education**

- Congressional App Challenge we would like to help middle and high schoolers build their own simple software app that they can submit for recognition in a contest
- Search-engine optimization help, social media help
